

## Dr Maulana Karenga

 Born <u>Ronald McKinley Everett</u>, July 14, 1941. He changed his name!



- He is an American activist, author, and professor of African Studies.
- Best known as the creator of the pan-African and African-American holiday of Kwanzaa.
- Studied at Los Angeles City College and the University of California, Los Angeles.
- Was active in the Black Power movement (self-determination) of the 1960s, joining the Congress of Racial Equality and Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

**Councill Taylor:** a Jamaican anthropologist and Negritudist who contested the <u>Eurocentric</u> view of other cultures as primitive and uncivilised.

In 1965, He and Hakim Jamal co-founded the black nationalist group US Organization.

**Malcolm X:** "Malcolm was the major African American thinker that influenced me in terms of nationalism and Pan-Africanism..."

...cultural revolution: Malcom X argues that we need a cultural revolution, that we must return to Africa culturally and spiritually, even if we can't go physically. And so that's a tremendous impact on US.

### Contributions

The rediscovery and appreciation of ancient Kemetic traditions in a new, relatable and meaningful way.

A departure from the dull and reductive translations of a very beautiful and moving literature...(fascination for literal and exact translation).

Understanding interpretation and application: Foundation of the Maatian moral ideal and its fruitfulness as an ethical option for our times.

Kwanzaa (1966): The first pan-African holiday (Dec. 26-Jan.1) AIM: to "give Blacks an alternative to the existing holiday and give Blacks an opportunity to celebrate themselves and their history, rather than simply imitate the practice of the dominant society."

#### Kwanzaa = cultural revolution


7 Pillars of Kwanzaa

- Imani (faith)





#### What is Maat?

- Maat was the <u>foundational</u> ideal of ancient <u>Egyptian</u> <u>religion and ethics.</u>
- Polysemic (coexistence of many possible meanings).
  - Conceptual elasticity. Categorical preciseness? Problematic?
- Maat has a "rich treasury of meaning."
- A pervasive and enduring element in Egyptian civilization, an inclusive defining cultural category.
- The conceptual elasticity of Maat as a category of interrelated ethical, social, religious, political and/or natural order significance proves invaluable.
- A general concept of <u>rightness</u>, including the <u>ontological</u> and <u>ethical</u> sense of truth, justice, righteousness, order-in a word, the rightness of things

# The notion of Maat




#### What is Maat? Cont. 1

- Maat as guide and order, whose centrality is not only as the basis (*Grundlage*) of existence but also as a guiding principle (*Richtschnur*) and goal (*Ziel*) of the divine world order. Moreover, it is defined as "rightness" and as a lawfulness of the social and natural order
- Maat is both the goddess and the personification of truth, cosmic balance, and justice.
- In <u>philosophical terms</u>, maat is the articulation of three ideals, namely:
  - **a**), the <u>ideal of knowledge</u>, that is to say, <u>the love of science</u>, the aspiration for knowledge (*tmlzj r rb*), and <u>more precisely</u>, for the knowledge of 'true being', of 'that which is true, sure, certain'; **b**) the moral ideal of truth, justice, and rectitude and; **c**) the metaphysical ideal of love and of the knowledge of Being (*Hpr*) which is at the 'beginning' of all being (*wnnt nbt*).

#### What is Maat? Conclusion

- "It is interesting and important to note that Ra creates the universe through maat, a term with multiple meanings, i.e., righteousness, truth, justice, order, harmony, rightness, evenness, levelness, etc.
- Its importance lies in the fact that it is a divine concept, power and practice which not only informed and aided Ra's action, but was established as the fundamental concept, power, and practice for the organization, maintenance and development of human society also. Thus, in each book maat is a central concern and focus, whether as truth, justice, righteousness, order on harmony." The Husia: Sacred wisdom of Ancient Egypt (1984).
